

First Nations connections and culture in Australia

The Australian Professional Standards for Teachers (the Standards) help you understand and develop your teaching practice and expertise across 4 career stages. One of these is Standard 2.4, which focuses on promoting reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians.

Understanding the Australian Professional Standards for Teachers Standard 1.4 and 2.4

The Australian Professional Standards for Teachers [Standard 1.4 and 2.4](#) requires teachers to demonstrate broad knowledge and understanding of the impact of culture, cultural identity, and linguistic background on the education of students from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander backgrounds.

Recognising and respecting the diverse cultures of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples including understanding First Peoples histories, languages, and living cultures is a central part. Integrating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives into your curriculum through teaching materials, classroom discussions, and activities that reflect their cultures and histories is also a key requirement.

Engaging first-hand by building relationships with local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities can provide valuable insights and resources to support your teaching and help you create a more inclusive classroom environment. Actively working towards reconciliation by fostering mutual respect and understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous students involves creating a classroom culture that values diversity and promotes equity. By understanding and respecting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, you can play a crucial role in promoting reconciliation and creating a more inclusive and equitable education system in Australia.
